




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
HALLOWEEN

When I was a young teen, my older brother and I would put on costumes and go out the evening before Halloween to see if we could fool some of our neighbors into giving us treats. We would knock on a door and say, "Tonight we bake, tomorrow we feast! Tonight we bake, tomorrow we feast!" It was amazing! Some thought it was Halloween and they had forgotten. To answer our request some would give us candy and some would give us coins. On Halloween, we would put on a different costume and go out again. After touring our neighborhood, we would put on different costumes and


go back to the houses that gave the best treats. Such shenanigans!

Halloween is a holiday celebrated each year on October 31. The tradition originated with the ancient festival "Samhain", when people would light bonfires and wear costumes to ward off ghosts. In the eighth century, Pope Gregory III designated November 1st as a time to honor all saints. Soon, All Saints Day incorporated some of the traditions of Samhain. The evening before was known as All Hallows Eve, and later Halloween. Over time. Halloween evolved into a day

of activities like trick-or-treat, carving jack-a-lanterns, festive gatherings, donning costumes and eating treats.

Halloween's origins date back to the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain (pronounced sow-in). The Celts who lived 2,000 years ago, mostly in the area that is now Ireland, the United Kingdom and northern France, celebrated their new year on November 1st.

This day marked the end of summer and harvest and the beginning of the dark, cold winter, a time of year that was often associated with human death. Celts believed that



on the night before the new year, the boundary between the worlds of the living and the dead became blurred. On the night of Oct 31st they celebrated Samhain, when it was believed that the ghosts of the dead returned to earth.

In addition to causing trouble and damaging crops. Celts thought that the presence of the otherworldly spirits made it easier for the Druids, or Celtic priests to make predictions about the future. For a people entirely dependent on the volatile natural world, these prophecies were an important source of comfort during the long, dark winter.

To commemorate the event, Druids built huge sacred bonfires, where the people gathered to burn crops and animals. During the celebration, the Celts wore costumes, typically consisting of animal heads and skins, and attempted to tell each other's fortunes.


When the celebration was over, they re-lit their hearth fires, which they had extinguished earlier that evening, from the sacred bonfire to help protect them during the coming winter. While I appreciate the history and traditions of Halloween, I personally prefer to celebrate the conclusion of the harvest season. The season begins to change from summer to fall, and the harvesters gather in the last remaining produce of the year. Fall has always been my favorite time of year! I enjoy watching the leaves changing colors. Just so, in our lives the Lord has many seasons for us. Spring time is a time of refreshing and new growth, and in fall (every day of our lives) the Lord wants us to shed our old leaves (habits, sins, relationships, etc.) and allow them to die out that He might grow new life in us.

The word "Selah" eventually was said to probably be a musical term meaning "to Pause" or "rest" or stop for a count. Selah stood out so much I started writing a song about it. God kept bringing it back to my heart.

Looking back, it makes sense to me that the Holy Spirit made that word stand out to me because it was a time of a lot of busyness and stress. I am naturally driven by many factors in life. Ministry, work, finances, volunteering, helping others and ect, etc, Housing cleaning, ect. All this and more fill most of my minutes in life and I am tempted to use the few extra minutes I have to myself to "check-out" or escape. But what I have found is that although these "escape" times do temporarily help me find the strength to get back at it (Life), they do not fix me in a way that is deep and true and lasts.

I love how the Passion Translation of the Bible interprets Selah as "Pause in His Presence". Although I think we all need to have time to just check out, I have found that as I pause in His (God's) presence I am able to truly rest and connect with God, to hear from him, and drink from a well of His love and wisdom and healing that will never run dry. My new song "Selah" isn't just about resting, it's about resting in "Him" the God of everything I need.

John 4:14 TPT- but if anyone drinks the living water I give them, they will never be thirsty again. For when you drink the water I give you, it becomes a gushing fountain of the Holy Spirit, flooding you with endless life.

CALL TO ME

> "Call to me and I will answer you, and show you great and mighty things which you do not know" Jerimiah 33:3

This encouraging invitation to pray and converse with God came to Jeremiah while he was in prison in Jerusalem. The city leaders had him locked up because his prophecies were all bad, about how Nebuchadnezzar and the Chaldeans were soon to ransack Jerusalem and burn it down and take the captives away to Babylon.

Jeremiah was a prophet chosen by God from his youth. As such, he was receiving Gods' words without any effort on his part. The hard part for Jeremiah was to deliver Gods' word to the community, who did not want to hear it. Early on, God tells him "Do not be afraid of their faces for I am with you to deliver (preserve) you." Later on as he is feeling the heat of persecution, Jeremiah reiterates that idea, praying "But the Lord is with me as a mighty, awesome One."

Praying scripture back to God is very powerful and helpful in that it shows our faith in the Word, reinforces our belief in God's Word and shows God we are paying attention. It is not nagging to remind God of his promises, rather it shows we believe the promises and it lifts us up.

Prayers are as widely diverse



and unique as the people who pray them. Praying to God, Jesus, or the Holy Spirit is really striking up a conversation with the Creator of All Things. It builds up the God/human connection. It can make you feel great! Reaching out to God can give us new perspective and open our hearts and minds to things we have never considered before.

Prayer is a very personal, individual quest to strengthen one's relationship with God. At the same time, prayer is very often a group activity. Matthew records for us Jesus' words in Matt18:19-20; "I say to you that if two of you agree on earth concerning anything that they ask, it will be done for them by My Father in

heaven. For where two or three are gathered together in My name, I am there in the midst of them." Agreeing with others in prayer would seem to be a more potent supplication than an individual prayer. Find a friend and agree in prayer.

I had been married for at least 12 years before I ever prayed with my wife. We learned to pray together in a marriage -boosting seminar called "Nova Shalom." We make time now to pray together nearly every day. It is a great activity to keep us bonded and aware of what's going on with each other.

In First Thessalonians 5:17-18 Paul encourages us to "pray without ceasing (uninterruptedly), in everything give thanks, for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." Certainly prayers of thanksgiving and gratitude are some of the most popular, but to be able to "pray without ceasing" would be a huge accomplishment. Is it attainable?

Just a few years ago during praise and worship here in our church, we sang an unfamiliar song with the refrain "I'm so


When Jesus enters the narrative of God's love

On more than one occasion I have referred to Joshua Aaron as my "Man Crush." Why? I need to go all the way back to junior high.


